This past weekend we welcomed Dcn. Ralph Poyo to St. Anastasia. I hope and pray you were able to take advantage of the brief but impactful mission presented by Dcn. Ralph. For those of you who were not able to, please consider going to the website and viewing his messages. For those who were able to participate, I believe you will agree that these messages were timely and helpful to us in looking

ahead.

I asked Dcn. Ralph to come because I sense the real need for us to start spiritually moving again. As Deacon shared, Satan would have us do nothing while we wait for this pandemic to end and return to "normal." If that were to occur, we would easily grow complacent, lethargic and possibly apathetic. While Covid has its own threats, I believe that this spiritual climate has an even greater threat because it is attacking our eternal souls.

On the second night of the mission, while continuing to call us to examine our responses to fear and our faith in Jesus, Deacon invited us participate in a simple small group process with each other. I believe that this invitation is not only important but vital for our parish. We must learn how to draw close to the Holy Spirit, learn how to engage Him, and receive instruction directly from Him.

With that in mind, I am asking each of you to rise and intentionally carve out some time to participate in these weekly small groups. Dcn. Ralph challenged us to do them for six weeks. If they are of no value then you can quit, but if they provide some good fruit from the Spirit then consider keeping the group going after the New Year.

Each week groups will gather together physically to help each other grow in the Four Fundamental Disciplines of a Disciple of Jesus Christ. Everyone who is a disciple should be grounded in these disciplines. They are what help each of us learn how to engage the Holy Spirit. Each group will run about 90 minutes a week and you will have an opportunity to share with other parishioners how your journey in those disciplines are going.

We had set up registration for small groups after the mission and this weekend's Mass. For those of you who still prefer to not come in physically, we can arrange for you to participate virtually. We want to remove every excuse for why we couldn't make this time for God and each other. Please go to stanastasia.net and fill out the online registration form. Please let the office know if you could help as a facilitator - Deacon will provide the short training needed. Fr. Paul

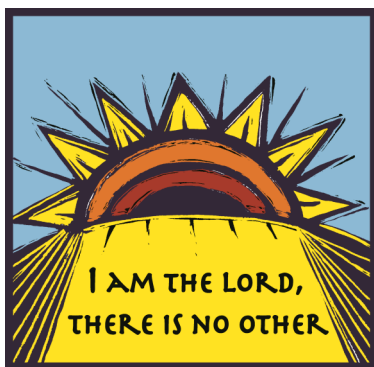

Attend a compassionate and timely Adult Education workshop about End of Life Planning from a Catholic Perspective. Faith Formation

In God Alone

Isaiah speaks to us today of Cyrus, King of Persia, anointed by the Lord. God calls Cyrus by name and leads him in service to the Israelites. In this passage we hear that it is the Lord who gives Cyrus his title, who arms him against his enemies, and who opens doors and unbars gates before him. And God does all of this so that the people will know that “I am the LORD,” and that “there is none besides me” (Isaiah 45:6).

Paul opens his letter with essentially the same notion—that in God alone we find our grace and peace. Paul also gives thanks to God on our behalf, calling to mind our work of faith, hope, and love. And in the familiar Gospel reading, Jesus tells the Pharisees to give to Caesar what is Caesar’s and to God what is God’s.

Sts Issac Jogues (1560-1646) & John De Brebeuf (1593-1649) & Their Companions Oct 19

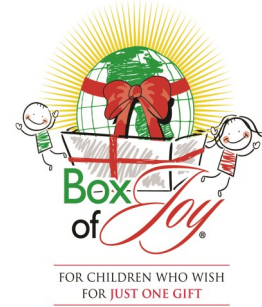
Their mission was to New France, but these missionaries found in present-day New York State and the province of Ontario a world wildly different from the homes they left behind. Six Jesuit priests, Fathers Isaac Jogues, John de Brébeuf, Anthony Daniel, Gabriel Lalemant, Charles Garnier, and Noël Chabanel—and Jesuit lay volunteers René Goupil and John LaLande—shared the gospel with the Na-

tive Americans they met, in languages they painstakingly learned, and through images they creatively adapted to the indigenous cultures (for example, John de Brébeuf’s “’Twas in the Moon of Wintertime: the Huron Carol”). But their evangelization was caught up in turmoil beyond their control: a smallpox epidemic, battles between French and English trading interests—the traders united only by their willingness to exploit the Native Americans—and conflict among the tribes themselves, Huron, Mohawk, Iroquois. The missionaries’ perseverance despite exhausting hardships, their steadfast courage in facing unspeakable tortures, and undaunted love even for those who martyred them, bore fruit, immediately in Kateri Tekakwitha’s sanctity, eventually in the Catholicism that still flourishes in the United States and Canada. 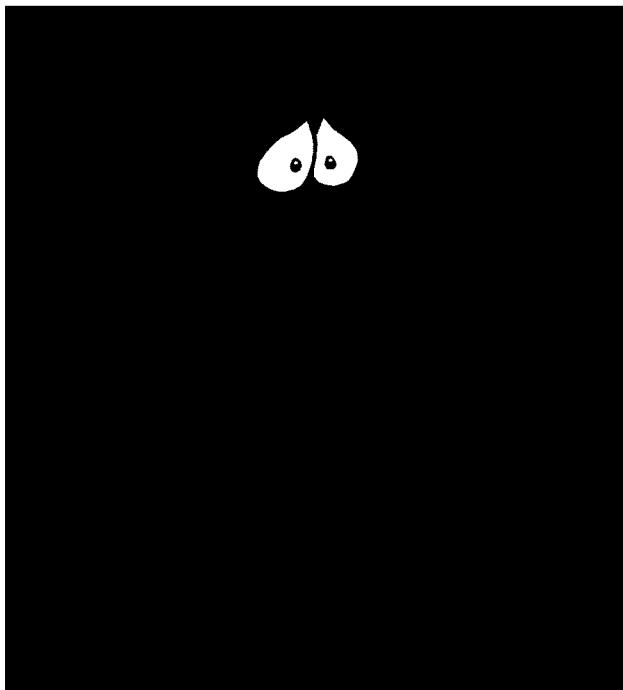

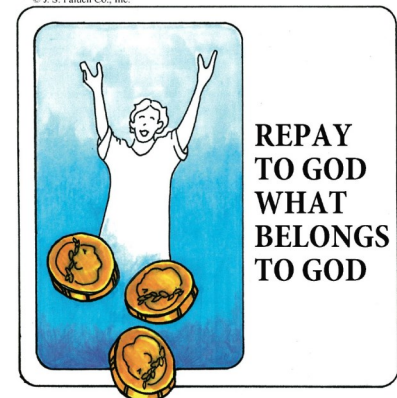
