We celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of the Lord, or what is traditionally called Corpus Christi, the Body of Christ. The Eucharist is the body of Christ; the body, blood, soul, and divinity of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Under the appearance of mere bread and wine are these hidden realities that are plainly seen with the “eyes” of one’s faith. The Eucharist is described by the Second Vatican Council as the source and summit of our faith. It is also described as the heart of our faith. The presence of Jesus in the Eucharist changes and transforms our lives. And that is precisely why Jesus choose to remain close to us, down through the generations, in this very close and intimate way; hidden in a tiny host and a drop of precious blood. How amazing and how awesome!

As we celebrate the Lord in the Blessed Sacrament, I encourage you to draw close to His Eucharistic presence, for the first time or for the thousandth time, and open your heart fully to receive the transformation He desires to give you! Your cup of blessing will overflow. And you help to transform the Church in your own time and place.



Pastor's Corner

The weekend of July 4/5 throughout the Diocese of New Ulm numerous changes in Priest Personnel will be taking place. May we pray for the parishes and priests that will be missing their former pastors, senior associates, and parishes. May we pray for smooth transitions in this difficult time of change and social unrest. May we pray for warm welcome of new priests and fruitful ministry within parishes and area faith communities. May we pray for the newly ordained and those transitioning to retirement and senior associate status.

Changes and planning are also going on at St. Anastasia and St. Boniface. **Mass schedules will be changing, please take note.** St. Anastasia will celebrate weekend Masses on Saturday at 4:30 pm (confession at 3:00 pm) and Sunday at 7:30 am, 10:30 am, and 7:30 pm (Holy Family in Silver Lake has dropped their Sunday evening Mass). St. Boniface will celebrate Mass on Saturday at 6:30 pm (confessions at 6:00 pm). Weekday Masses at St. Anastasia will be Monday and Wednesday at 5 pm, Tuesday and Friday at 7:00 am, and Thursday at 9:00 am (School Mass). We will continue to live-stream the Sunday 10:30 am, Tuesday 7:00 am, and Thursday 9:00 am Masses.

Treasures From Our Tradition

At the heart of today’s solemnity is a eucharistic procession, held in many parishes, that calls to mind the procession of Holy Thursday, yet has a purpose different from the somber adoration in the night watch. In the late Middle Ages, a procession through the city with the Blessed Sacrament was an occasion of heartfelt joy and great emotion. In a time when people

seldom approached the altar to receive Holy Communion, the procession through the streets, past homes and workplaces, was a vibrant reminder that Christ was with them as a dear companion and guide.

Every year on this day, a joyful procession winds through the streets of Rome from the Lateran cathedral. A few years ago, Pope John Paul II, deeply moved at the sight of the throng accompanying the sacred host, said that we ought to feel profoundly united with the faithful everywhere in the world at such a moment. “Before our mind’s eye all the Churches of the world, from East to West, from North to South, are present.” Originally this feast was on the Thursday after Trinity Sunday, but after the calendar reform of 1970, its title was expanded from “Corpus Christi” to “The Body and Blood of Christ” and in the United States it was moved to the Sunday after Trinity Sunday. Even though Easter season ended two weeks ago, this beautiful feast is aglow with Easter light.

God fed them with manna and quenched their thirst with water drawn from a rock. In these miraculous encounters, the people came to believe that God was truly with them on their journey, and with this assurance, grew to rely on and put their trust in God. Jesus began his ministry with a pilgrimage to the desert, where he prayed and placed his trust in his heavenly Father. Strengthened at God’s hand, Jesus stayed true to his mission even in the face of cruel death, giving himself, his very life and substance to us in bread and wine at the Last Supper and for his disciples for ages unending.




