Pastor's Corner

A reflection from Deacon Ralph Palo;

May our fears not overtake our trust in the Lord, but may we trust ever in the love of our God and **“COME”** follow him. May we live a focused life that has the Lord ever first in our lives for this world with overwhelm us with fear and disappointments, he will call us to life. Trust in the Lord!

Matthew 14. The apostles were in the middle of darkness and the sea was kicking up. As fear of the unknown was increasing,

Jesus approached them, walking on the water. They were immediately confronted with fear because what they were witnessing couldn't be true. People can't walk on water. If that is not Jesus, then it must be a ghost of Jesus. Despite what appears to be true, the truth is that Jesus is God and has the ability to walk on water.

As Jesus approached and told them not to be afraid, Peter began to believe that it was Jesus. His faith compelled him to do the unthinkable. *“Lord, if it is you, command me to come out to you on the water.”* (vs 28 NRSV)

It is at this point that the other apostles had to have reacted to Peter's request. There is no record of it, but if I were there, I could imagine the thoughts and even comments they would have said.

“Are you nuts?”, or *“You must be crazy!”*, or *“You can't go out there, you will die for sure”*, would be some of my own thoughts, let alone those of the apostles who were there. Jesus rewards the faith of Peter by commanding him to join Him on the water. I can imagine the Lord's voice booming over the sound of the wind and the waves. **“COME”!**

Peter and many of those with him have lived on the sea much of their lives, and they know with great certainty that Peter can't walk on water. Yet, they watch with shock as Peter climbs over the gunnel. What Peter understood was that if Jesus could sustain himself on the water, then Jesus could sustain him. What does that mean?

Like the apostles remaining in the security of their boat during the stormy seas, we hide in our homes in fear. And yet, Jesus is out there in the midst of the threatening darkness and He is calling each of us to **“COME”!** Come out from the fear and fake security of the boat and learn to trust in the One who sustains everything. When we cling to God, we find the courage to push through the fear of the unknown and embrace what we do know – **JESUS ROSE FROM THE DEAD!**

If we have died with Christ, then will rise with Him. Let us hold on to that truth and leave the quarantine trusting not that we won't get sick, but that our lives belong to Jesus who loves us and wants our very best! Jesus, I trust in YOU!

Treasures From Our Tradition

The Eucharistic Prayers at the heart of our liturgy have a long history, beginning with the extemporaneous prayers of the early Christians. The presiders gave thanks from their hearts, not from any prearranged text, over the gifts of bread and wine. When the assembly had the sense that enough was said, someone would call out "Amen!" and that was that. For the most part, the plan flowed directly from Jewish meal prayers,

which always recalled God's mighty deeds. Some other markers and signposts were added almost everywhere fairly early, like the presider's call to attention: "Lift up your hearts!"

Scholars have provided us with translations of many early texts. These have actually helped us craft new liturgical prayers, because until the liturgical reforms of forty years ago, no one could recall any prayer but the Roman Canon, now called Eucharistic Prayer I. For hundreds of years in the West, it was our only Eucharistic Prayer, and it was only in Latin. But the history of our Eucharistic Prayers is amazingly fruitful, and models have come down to us that have yielded new insights and expressions. The old custom of improvising texts according to a master plan has not endured, but we have now rediscovered a plan of standardizing the text while allowing for a great variety.



Twelfth Sunday in Ordinary Time

In our world today, it seems there are many things to make us fearful. We can become distraught over personal finances, relationships, poor choices our children are making, issues with jobs, the changing climate, the way our parish is being run, or a zillion other things. The problems may not even be evil but may be simply life and all its challenges. But these struggles are real, and sometimes we seek unhealthy solutions. Many people suffer with issues of anxiety and depression, and fear leads others to addiction as a means of coping. In our Gospel today, God lovingly calls us beyond that darkness to light.

WORTH MORE THAN MANY SPARROWS

Sometimes we look for very complex answers when a simple promise or solution is right in front of us. As I am writing and looking out the window, I see half a dozen little birds sitting in a bush. Their presence is a reminder to me of God's love and care for each and every one of us. If something that seems so insignificant or incidental is known by God, how

much more are we loved and cared for! Take a moment, look at the world around you, breathe, take it in, and ask God for the help you need. Turn matters over and place your trust in a loving God.

Remember, though, Jesus seldom heals without some sort of action on our part. When you have given your concern over to God, other concrete steps may be necessary. Is it time to schedule an appointment with a professional? Time to name an issue? Or time for the sacrament of reconciliation? Evil's power comes from remaining in the darkness. When we no longer close ourselves off or suffer alone but share our concerns with someone, we can begin to grow and heal and move past them. It is seldom magical or instantaneous. It is a long arduous process. But we hold on to the simple reminder, "You are worth more than many sparrows!"
