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This weekend is/was the Feast of the *Assumption of Our Lady into Heaven*. We have been doing a scripture study from the *Lectio* series hosted by FORMED on Mary. Mary is well rooted in the Old Testament, New Testament, and the early Church Fathers. A good knowledge of the Sacred Scriptures would greatly help all to see the rich deposit of faith that has been our tradition as Catholics. A good knowledge of the Sacred Scriptures would help all of us to be able to defend and promote our faith. As you receive the upcoming newsletter with information for Elementary, EDGE and Confirmation program please consider your own formation as adults and join one of the courses offered.

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Following is a brief description of each session. This fall, Thursdays at 2pm, *Lectio: Mary, The Bible and The Mother of God*, will be offered.

Mary The Promises Woman (session 1): Marian doctrines come to life when viewed in the context of Scripture as a whole. And not just to life, but to a robust life, as our eyes are opened to images, narratives, and prefigurements that we often pass over in our reading of the Bible. Dr. Pitre, the presenter, provides three guideposts for the course: the foundation upon which Mariology rests, the use of typology, and the teachings of the Church Fathers. *The first session, Mary as the New Eve.* (page 7).

The New Ark (session 2): Mary is contemplated as the New Ark of the New Covenant. The Ark of the Old Testament was a precious treasure, which the Israelites prepared according to God's special direction to be the container for the tablets of the Law, the rod of Aaron, the manna from Heaven, and the dwelling place of divine glory. The perfection of such an item was most fitting given its role. The Ark of the Covenant was a critical part of the Exodus story and remained a central element of Jewish worship throughout the Old Testament until it was hidden by Jeremiah around the time of the Babylonian exile. With the incarnation, when our Lord came to inaugurate a New Exodus, Mary became his New Ark. Perfectly fashioned, she is a fitting dwelling place for the Most High God, a divinely designed cooperator in the New Covenant, a sign of hope for all of us who are called to be temples of the Holy Spirit. (Page 25)

Mother of the Messiah (*session 3*): The genealogy of Saint Matthew's Gospel serves as a foundation, showing that Jesus, Mary's Son, is the heir of the royal, messianic, Davidic line. Based on this foundation, the Old Testament prophecies from Genesis 3:15, Isaiah 7:10-14, and Micah 5:2-5, as well as the early Church's definitions on Jesus's divinity, all work together to show that the mother of the Messiah is also called the Mother of God. (page 43)

Marian Study (cont. from front page)

The Queen Mother (session 4): Jesus's royal lineage reveals another important title and crucial role of Mary – the queen mother. In ancient Israel it was not the wife of the king who ruled as queen, but rather the king's mother. Understanding this ancient royal office helps to explain the honor Catholics show to Mary and the reason they ask for her intercession. (page 63)

The Perpetual Virgin (session 5): Recognizing the office of Mary as Queen Mother deepens our understanding of why Catholics venerate Mary – a practice often met with confusion and opposition from non-Catholics. The Church also teaches that not only was Mary a virgin when she conceived Jesus, but that she remained a virgin for her entire life. This doctrine is nor merely a statement of historical fact, but also a teaching that reveals profound truths about our spiritual lives. (page 79)

Mother of Sorrows (*session 6*): We will consider how Mary shares in her divine Son's Passion. Although Mary is spared the pain of birth, her travails occur at the Passion of her Son at Calvary when she becomes the mother of John, the beloved disciple and, by extension, all of us, giving rise to the birth of Christ's Church. (page 95)

The New Rachel (session 7): Rachel is the wife of Jacob and the mother of Joseph and Benjamin in the Old Testament. Jesus is seen as the new Joseph (old Testament Joseph), who is betrayed by his brothers, suffers greatly, and becomes the source of salvation for his sinful brothers and the Gentiles. Mary is seen as the New Rachel.

Questions and Answers (session 8): As the study ends, we will have an opportunity to listen to Dr. Pitre answer questions on some topics related to the various sessions. This session gives Dr. Pitre a chance to summarize and emphasize some of the material he has presented over these last weeks.

Faith Formation

Wy Pray?

The "foreigners" as Isaiah calls them, the "Gentiles" as Paul calls them, or the "Canaanites" as Matthew calls them are called to worship the one true God in prayer. As we listen to today's readings, perhaps we are tempted to ask: Why pray? The question is rhetorical: it is tantamount to asking why should friends talk to one another or people in love kiss one another. Prayer is a way of relating to God, a way of talking to God. The apostles had the opportunity to talk to Jesus in the flesh. We have the opportunity to talk to Jesus Christ in prayer. Our relationship with him must be enthusiastic; it cannot be faint-hearted. John Donne, a fifteenth-century poet, knew what the qualities of good prayer were. Donne asks God to treat him differently from most Christians. The poet does not want God to merely "knock, breathe, shine, and seek to mend," but also to "break, blow, burn, and make me new" (Holy Sonnets, XIV).

It takes a dynamic faith on our part to come to God in prayer. As Jesus once said, "Knock and the door will be opened to you" (Matthew 7:7). It may take

pounding the door down, but if we are as persistent as the woman in today's Gospel, the results will follow.

St Pius X (1835-1914) Aug 9

Presidential vetoes we understand. But imagine vetoing a papal election! Yet in the conclave of 1903, the Archbishop of Cracow (ironically, a predecessor in that office of Karol Wojtyla, the future John Paul II) vetoed the leading candidate on the order of the Austro-Hungarian emperor. Instead, the cardinals elected Giuseppe Sarto of Venice as Pius X. the first pope, after a succession of nobles and diplomats, to hail from humble origins. Nor did the papacy alter his endearing simplicity. Tailors eventually made his cassock cuffs detachable because he absentmindedly wiped his fountain pen on them, forgetting that his old black cassock had been replaced by papal white! Taking as his motto "To restore all things in Christ" (Ephesians 1:10), Pius condemned the theological innovations called "modernism," yet dramatically altered the thencommon practice whereby people rarely received Communion for fear of unworthiness, mandating early First Communion and urging everyone to frequent reception. Refusing to bless troops assembled in Saint Peter's Square—"I bless peace, not war!"-he died brokenhearted as World War I engulfed Christian Europe despite his peacemaking efforts.
