We are in trying times as Church; we are under attack by many forces. Deacon Ralph Poyo writes and speaks to this concern in his ministry at *New Evangelization Ministries*. The following blog addresses some of these concerns and hopefully gives us marching orders to renewal. Where Is The Holy Spirit by Deacon Ralph

As I have been reflecting on the state of the Church during the Covid 19 Pandemic, I have been pondering on what the circumstances surrounding the virus have revealed about the Church. By the Church, I am not really focusing on the institutional Church but the people that make up all our parishes and live in our dioceses.

I am fairly certain that most of those who were in our churches went through the basics and received their entrance Sacraments. I believe that most people would agree with me that those in our pews have at least been Baptized and received the Holy Spirit.

An Honest Look

Like a profound earthquake revealing something hidden, the Covid 19 crisis has unearthed a view of the true state of our Church - the people and their faith in Jesus. After working in the Church for over thirty years, I have a unique opportunity to look back, with 20/20 vision, and see the fruits of my labor - the fruits of the labors of my cocatechists and all their hard work in local parishes.

As I look over the landscape of how people are responding to the virus there is one question that is staring right at us if we are brave enough to acknowledge it. If the vast number of us received the Holy Spirit, then where is He in the lives of believers? If He is to guide us into all truth then why are so many people leaving our parishes? Why will so many probably not return to Mass after the crisis is over?

Why are the vast majority of baptized "believers" responding to fear rather than the fruits of the Holy Spirit - love, joy, **PEACE**? Isn't it for such a time as this that we, those who profess to believe in Christ, would rise above those who do not know Christ nor His Spirit, and show the world what faith in Jesus gives us?

Instead, we live and act like the rest of the world who sees their lives as purely earthly, lacking any transcendence. The stark absence of the power of the Holy Spirit operating in the lives of the vast majority of baptized believers is so obvious, how can we not see it? I don't know about you but this gives me cause to go back and look at the work I have done and see where I may have missed the mark. What must I do differently going forward. However, as bleak as this looks, I am hopeful because this isn't the first time in the history of the Church (Institution), when the people have gone astray and God has kept a remnant. As one called into the mission field, I must now turn my attention to this remnant and help them draw closer to the Advocate who was given to us for such a time as this. I know that if I can help them draw closer to Him, he will do the rest.

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Faith Formation

Familiar Insights

Spiritual teachers tend to repeat themselves, and to repeat other teachers. Maybe there really aren't that many different truths to tell. Just a lot of slow, sleepy human beings—like us—who need to hear the basics over and over. Consider today's readings.

People complain God isn't "fair," and Ezekiel answers that God is more than fair. People choose their own fates, and people can change. Even evildoers can turn, do right, and live. "Actions speak louder than words." A fresh new insight? Hardly.

Paul tells the Philippians that he would truly be encouraged if those who claimed to be believers would, in fact, look to others' interests and not their own. "The proof of the pudding is in the eating." A novel idea? I don't think so.

In Jesus' story of the farmer and his sons, everyone knows that the one who said he wouldn't work—but did—is way ahead of the one who said he would work—but didn't. "Talk is cheap." Heard that before?

St Therese of the Child Jesus

"The cornerstone's dated 1872, but the stained glass is much later," explained the pastor, astonished when his visitor accurately dated it to just before the Great Depression, explaining, "The window for the Little Flower"—Thérèse's nick-

name—"gives it away." From her canonization in 1925, her statues and windows adorn most churches where European immigrants worshiped. Entering Carmel at fifteen, victim of tuberculosis at twenty-four, Thérèse proposed her "Little Way" to sanctity: doing ordinary tasks with extraordinary love. Thus ordinary Catholics, many of whom had lost loved ones to tuberculosis, embraced her. Though she never left her cloister, this Carmelite's spiritual communion and devoted correspondence with missionaries earned her the title Patroness of Missions. Her autobiography, Story of a Soul, continuously in print since her death, chronicles her prayerful perseverance through doubt and caused her to be the youngest person ever named a Doctor of the Church. Countless physical healings and spiritual conversions testify to her fulfillment of her deathbed promise: "After my death, I will let fall a shower of roses. I will spend my heaven doing good upon earth!" partnering of medical science and spirituality. Finally, how comforting for us ordinary Christians, this extraordinary saint's most frequent advice: "Pray, hope, and don't worry!" Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.




