


Gospel, but early in Jesus' ministry in John's gospel. At the time of Jesus the temple had become in some sense a place of commodification.

Oxen, sheep, and doves were sold to be sacrificed. It wasn't enough for one to bring one's own animals. They had to pass an inspection, and were "pre-certified," so to speak, guaranteed to be without blemish and therefore worthy of sacrifice. Of course, there might have been a markup for the quality assurance. For a nice price you could buy a worthy sacrifice. How quickly and easily does religion seem to fall into a trap of commodification? Similar things have happened in our own church history.

The challenge of commodification of religion is not limited to Jesus' day, or the annals of church history. Commodification of God's grace happens today too. The unholy alliance of money and the access to religion that it buys were scandalous then, and should be scandalous today. Jesus responds to this scandal as the scripture foretold (Ps69:9). He is zealous, passionate for his Father's house, which has been turned into a bazaar.

Those with the vested interest in the status quo are upset. But Jesus replies with his parabolic riddle speech "Destroy this temple and in three days I will raise it up." Of course, he is referring to the temple of his own body. But the stakeholders do not see the deeper meaning of his speech. They see only literal realities and they know that the temple took nearly half a century to build. To them, Jesus must have seemed a wild-eyed zealot, off his rocker and half-baked. He was dangerous, a threat to business and religious interest, and would have to be stopped.

But for Jesus, the temple is holy, not worthy of profanation, neither the Father's house nor Jesus' own self. The example Jesus gives us today demands consideration. We must recoil at every instance of commodification religion, or a selling of God's grace. God's presence is not to be bartered; it is not a commodity, God's grace is given freely.



FEAST OF FAITH

Postures of the Mass

In the Mass, we pray not only with our lips, but with our bodies as well. We stand when the ministers enter. In Western culture, standing is a sign of attention, a mark of respect: all stand when the judge enters the courtroom, for example. Standing is also an ancient posture of prayer, mentioned frequently in the Old Testament. When the readings begin, we sit down: a listening posture. Mary sat at Jesus' feet to listen to his teaching; the crowds sat on the hillside or the seashore to hear his words. Kneeling is another posture that is full of meaning. It expresses adoration and worship, but it can also express humility and contrition. We bow: a sign of honor and reverence, acknowledging the presence of God, especially when we receive the Eucharist. And there are other ritual gestures as wellstriking the breast, genuflecting, and of course making the sign of the cross. THE GOOD NEWS Total Allegiance

In previous weeks we have seen how the theme of covenant—as a preparation for the baptismal covenant celebrated at Easteroccupies an important place in our cycle of Lenten readings. The notion of covenant as a relationship between two parties carries with it an expectation of mutual accountability and fidelity to the terms of the covenant. When God forged the covenant with the Jewish people on Mt. Sinai, it was a pledge of God's protection, and it would forever permit them familiar access as the Chosen People. For their part, the

Jewish people were to observe the dictates of the law, summarized most succinctly here in the form of the Ten Commandments. To be in a covenantal relationship with the Lord God requires an exclusive relationship, just as discipleship with Jesus—ritualized in baptism—demands a total allegiance to him and none other. Rice Bowls


As part of our traditional Lenten practices we will be collecting for Operation Rice Bowl. Your contribution of spare change during lent helps feed the hungry in this country and around the world.

Our Lenten Program for 2021

Episode 4: What's our Story? Your life is a story. And it's caught up in the great story of humanity. 
CCW Rummage Sale
