

# The Epiphany

# OF THE LORD

January 2, 2022

The magi may be historically controversial, but there is no doubt about the way in which they thrill our imagination and make us wonder about their visit to the child. Wonder and excitement about journeying to Jesus are important for every Christian- king, or commoner. It is not from the Bible but from a legend recorded by the eighth-century saint and first English historian Bede the Venerable that we have numbered and named the magi: Melchior, Caspar, and Balthasar. The scholars rightly debate historical issues; as listeners we simply accept the narrative of the feast as story, but as story laden with symbols and rich in theological associations.

Guided by their natural and scientific wisdom, equipped with wealth and readiness to take risks, the magi discover that following a star and searching for the truth can lead one into a political minefield. It was a widespread belief that heavenly portents marked the birth of great leaders, and so they came to Jerusalem to look for a baby whom they described as the "newborn king of the Jews."

Panicking at the suggestion of any threat to his power, Herod gathers around him his "yes" men, those whom Matthew names as the same opponents of Jesus in the passion narrative, and inquires of them where the Messiah was to be born. The wisdom of the word of God in the Hebrew scripture is thus offered and accepted by the magi. They have the humility to know that they are not self-sufficient, that they need help on their search; and they have the discernment that sees through Herod's hypocritical and vicious suggestion that, when the magi have found the child, they return to tell Herod the whereabouts of the child so that he, too, can go and pay him homage.

The most important gift we can offer Christ - the gift that is richer than any gold, frank-incense, or myrrh - is, of course, the wealth of our love and the fragrant readiness of suffering that this will inevitably entail. In the gifts that the wise ones offer to the Christ Child, there is again the hint of the paschal mystery: the myrrh of embalming, the frank-incense that fragranced the temple sacrifice and burned before the holy of holies, and the gold of precious value. The magi go home by another route when they realize that they are being manipulated by hypocrisy and jealous power seeking. It is, Matthew suggests, often the strangers and outsiders who reveal to us, as individuals and as nations, how and what we should be seeking and how to come home to this truth.

This is the first instance of God expanding the Abrahamic covenant beyond the Israelites. For nearly two thousand years, the Hebrews have been God's chosen people. Now, with the arrival of Jesus, the promise of God's kingdom expands to include all of humanity. "Lord, every nation on earth, will adore you!" (Living Liturgy, pp. 36-37)

### **Journey Toward God**

In our celebration of the Epiphany, two interwoven themes are present in the readings today. God is beginning something new, and God gathers all of humanity to participate. For Isaiah, God's bright light, manifested in the people of Israel, attracts and summons people from many nations to Jerusalem. In the letter to the Ephesians, God's grace makes the Gentiles coheirs and co-partners in the gospel. Matthew tells the story of the fulfillment of God's promises to Israel through the birth of Jesus, and simultaneously leading foreigners to share in these same promises. With the birth of Jesus, God chose a particular people, in a particular time and place, to enter most directly into the human story. Today's readings teach that God did this in order to gather all people, all cultures, into unity with God. Like the magi, we are drawn into a journey toward God, becoming co-partners in God's work.
