Just before the Last Supper, "Satan entered into Judas" (Luke 22:3). Even with Jesus' chosen disciples some will fall, some will rise, some will both fall and rise. We can identify with all of them in large or small ways. Jesus sits at table and announces at the beginning of the meal that this is to be his last. Bread and cup become an event of Body and Blood which establishes a new relationship of participating in and sharing his life. Tonight the disciples recline around the table with him; tomorrow they will decline to be guests at the board of the cross.

And then it is off to the Mount of Olives: Jesus in agony, struggling in prayer to surrender to his Father's will. Then comes the pain of betrayal by a friend, the sword-slashing panic by the awakened apostles, and the command of nonviolence from Jesus. Arrested and parceled up is false accusation led away to judgment.

All Jesus' friends are scattered; even Peter follows only "at a distance." He, too, is put on trial by a servant girl outside Pilate's courtroom, and a cock's crow brings in the verdict of shameful guilt. But when Jesus is brought out, he passes by Peter, turns and looks at him...and Peter is saved.

Scourged and mocked, Jesus is led out to his death - the innocent, nonviolent victim of the sin of the world. A man from the country, Simon of Cyrene, is made to help him carry his cross but Jesus is the Servant who will still reach out to others. When some of the women of Jerusalem follow him like a mourning chorus, Jesus ministers to their grief but begs them to make it a larger lamentation for all those who are unfaithful to their God. On Golgotha, Jesus ministers also to the poor criminal who recognizes him as a just one. Lover of sinners to the end, Jesus allows this thief to enter Paradise. Then Luke puts on Jesus' lips the words of Psalm 31: "Into your hands I commend my spirit," or Mark's or Matthew's cry of "My God, My God, why have you abandoned me?" (Psalm 22).

For a moment, then, we go down silently on our knees, rising up to hear the faith of a non-Gentile proclaim before the human wreck of a dead man: "This mas was innocent beyond doubt." This is the faith that will take us through Holy Week and through the killing fields in our own world. Hopefully, we will minister like Joseph of Arimathea: taking the wounded body of Christ, our suffering sisters and brothers, off their crosses, wrapping them in our compassion and advocating for them before the powerful with gentle but brave persistence. *Living Liturgy*, *p.* 102




THE MESSAGE OF CHRIST'S LOVE


