

Through the prophet Isaiah, the Lord tells Ahaz to ask for a sign in today's first reading. God longs for Ahaz, king of Judah, to remain faithful. The people of Judah faced great suffering at this time as the threats of war and government overthrow loomed large. God wants Ahaz and the people to keep their trust in the divine strong. God offers the child Emmanuel as a sign to affirm: "God is with us." God also longs for our faithfulness and trust. These practices take time. To continue deepening our relationship with God, we need not be nervous to ask God for a sign of the divine presence truly with us.

In a dream, a messenger of God tells Joseph in the gospel not to fear what he cannot understand, not to disown the mystery but enter into it. Joseph wakes up and succeeds where we often fail: he does something about the dream. Obedient to God's word, he responds for the first of many times, "as the angel of the Lord had commanded." This biblical dreamer is also a person of action. Joseph offers the hospitality of his love and lineage to Mary and to the stranger-child whom she carries in her womb. He is the radically blessed poor man, ready to surrender the right to choose a name for the child, and generously offering to Jesus, "he who saves," a paternity not of his own flesh. What onlookers might consider a scandal, Joseph and Mary believe is the action of the Holy Spirit, who continues to do "scandalous" things in our midst.

Joseph trusts in God's outrageous plan for his family despite every reason to give up. A virgin impregnated by the Holy Spirit is going to give birth to the savior of the world? God asks Joseph to believe in the most far-fetched reality - and to buck societal expectations for marriage and family life. God asks big things of us too. How can we ready our hearts so that, when the time comes we, too, can answer God's call?

Familiar stories accompany us in the days leading up to Christmas. Let us listen with fresh perspectives and awe at the miracles being proclaimed: The Savior is born into this world; his mother, Mary, conceived through the power of the Holy Spirit; Joseph heard God's messenger speaking in his dreams. It is often said these late December days are a magical time of year. But what happened with Mary and Joseph is no illusion. Let us marvel at God's goodness as we approach the birth of Christ.

Remember that only gifts made by December 31st can help reduce the amount of taxes you owe next April. A Charitable Remainder Trust is designed for individuals with highly appreciated assets like farm land or stock. Charitable Remainder Trusts (CRTs) offer donors extra tax advantages while allowing the donor to set the life income rate they would like to receive (generally 5% to 7%). As a donor, you can designate your parish to benefit from your gift after your lifetime. There are many variations of these trusts, and we work with Catholic charitable foundations that can walk you through various alternatives. These foundations also offer the expertise of attorneys who work with every day to insure competent investment advice. A Charitable Gift Annuity (CGA) provides an immediate tax deduction while providing a predictable stream of income during your life or other period of time you choose. You can name your parish to be the beneficiary of your CGA after your lifetime.



Just a reminder: SCRIP is available for sale after weekend masses and during regular business hours at the St A's parish office.

SCRIP allows you to purchase gift cards for hundreds of local/national merchants. You always receive a card for the full value of your purchase. In addition the parish receives a small rebate from each of the vendors. The proceeds go to support the educational programs of St A's, including all Religious Education classes. The profit you generate can be applied to the tuition of any student you choose or to the Education Fund.

PRAYER OF THE WEEK OUR FASCINATING FAITH

Las Posadas (December 16-24)

Of the many Latin American traditions for the celebration of Advent and Christmas, the tradition of *Las Posadas* seems to be the best known. It originated in the last half of the eighteenth century when the boisterous *Misas de Aguinaldo* were no longer celebrated in Mexico. To replace these Masses, the laity decided to celebrate in their own homes by taking what they had seen dramatized in the churches: the journey of the Galilean immigrants, Joseph and Mary of Nazareth, when they were looking for an inn (*posada*) in Bethlehem of Judea. Like the "O Antiphons" of the official liturgy, these *posadas* were celebrated on nine consecutive nights.

The journey of Joseph and Mary from inn to inn sadly continues every day in the fearful and tired steps taken by so many immigrants in this country. Like the Holy Family, Latin American families look for hospitality with the hope of finding a new life for their sons and daughters. Unfortunately, many citizens of the United States behave like the people of Bethlehem, preferring to close their door in the face of the immigrants rather than welcoming them. Perhaps that is the reason that the tradition of *Las Posadas* has taken on so much importance among the Latinos in the United States. We know firsthand what Joseph and Mary experienced two thousand years ago. We have to ask ourselves: When will the human heart change? When will we open the doors of our heart to our immigrant Lord?
