

The shepherds drop everything too and see the Christ Child - to whom the Lord revealed. Imagine how different their lives would have been had they stayed in the fields, deciding that they were "too busy" to change course. Our God is a God of interruptions. God works in unexpected ways and in unexpected times. In the busyness of this Christmas season, let us be open to holy interruptions.

When we experience interruptions to our day-to-day routines, how do we respond? Is it with a spirit of openness, with the hopeful outlook that perhaps there is a message meant for us in the disruption? It is difficult to live in a way that leaves us fully open to whatever each moment presents. Sometimes love and duty requires us to tend to our work and our routines with a single-minded dedication and focus. There are times, however, when we need to be jolted out of those routines so that we can remember the sacredness and divine potential of each moment. This Christmas narrative serves as a reminder that the most significant gifts could arrive at seemingly insignificant (or inconvenient) times.

Holiness appears in the messy realities of daily life. God's messengers

appear to the shepherds in the fields. Mary and Joseph experience the most sacred night of their lives inside a stable meant for barn animals. The gospel writer leaves out the exact details of Mary's delivery, but we can be sure it was messy and painful like every other human birth. Nativity sets and Christmas cards often depict a pristine manger scene - likely a far cry from that night's realities. Holiness is not clean and tidy. Instead, God meets us in the mess. 

YEAR-END GIVING

The end of the year is not far away, and it is time to start thinking of strategies to maximize the tax benefits of year-end giving. Federal tax laws and many state laws make it possible to reduce or eliminate taxes on gifts to charities like your parish, diocese, schools and other ministries. Remember that only gifts made by December 31st can help reduce the amount of taxes you owe next April. Please consult your professional tax advisor for tax strategies for your personal situation. Please make sure you call the parish office to let us know you are doing this so that when the check comes we know who's it is.

A Charitable Remainder Trust is designed for individuals with highly appreciated assets like farm land or stock. Charitable Remainder Trusts (CRTs) offer donors extra tax advantages while allowing the donor to set the life income rate they would like to receive (generally 5% to 7%). As a donor, you can designate your parish to benefit from your gift after your lifetime. There are many variations of these trusts, and we work with Catholic charitable foundations that can walk you through various alternatives. These foundations also offer the expertise of attorneys who work with every day to insure competent investment advice. A Charitable Gift Annuity (CGA) provides an immediate tax deduction while providing a predictable stream of income during your life or other period of time you choose. You can name your parish to be the beneficiary of your CGA after your lifetime.

Life Insurance

If you own life insurance policies that you no longer need, the cash value of these policies may be another source from which to make gifts to your parish, and they may result in significant state and/or federal estate tax savings. You can also name your parish as beneficiary of your life insurance or annuity.

Gifts of Cash

The most popular way to give to charity is still by cash or check. Gifts completed by December 31st will qualify for tax deductibility for the current tax year.

WHAT ALL THE WAITING HAS BEEN FOR



The stress of preparation, of waiting, is reflected in both Isaiah and Paul's letter to Titus. Luke tells us of the exhaustion that Mary and Joseph felt: a young pregnant wife and her husband, forced to travel just as she is about to give birth, unable even to find a room to stay in. It must have been miserable. They must have been afraid. In the midst of this exhaustion, misery, and fear, a child is born, a Son is given. Merry Christmas from the staff and students at St. Anastasia school!




