

Today's well-known gospel is set in the darkness of night. Nicodemus, a Jewish leader and Pharisee, visits Jesus after the sun goes down to avoid being seen with the man who makes the religious leaders of the day tremble. Professing belief in Jesus brings about real consequences. We may be judged or dismissed by others. Perhaps even more difficult, we may have our own sinfulness exposed as we strive to live in the light of Christ.

Lent is a season of transition as we journey with Jesus from the darkness of death to the Easter light of new life. Consider spending time this week intentionally reflecting on your sins. Ask for God's healing mercy through the sacrament of reconciliation or in the quiet of your prayer time.

The reading from the Second Book of Chronicles details the darkness that has befallen the Jewish people in the wake of the desecration of the temple and Babylonian exile. Their suffering is real and profound-and still, God shows up. God's love for the people remains steadfast and strong. God's mercy is at work in the actions of King Cyrus of Persia, who is not Jewish but recognizes the centrality of the temple for the Jewish people and allows then to return to rebuild it. God shines the divine light on the people in their darkness hour. This is the same light that came into the world for the salvation of all creation. The light we are baptized with. The light which reveals the truth and draws people toward the truth. *Living Liturgy, p. 79* 

### EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP - RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS: Awake, O Sleeper!

This morning came a little earlier than I would have liked — Daylight Savings Time always does. Sometimes that morning sunlight seems more intrusive than illuminating. You're still half-lost in sleep, and that sun is demanding of you a lot more than you're ready to give.

I've said it, and I'm sure you've said it, too. "Just five more minutes." You hit the "snooze" button on your iPhone once (maybe twice? Show of hands?) and turn away from the window.

So many kings of the Old Testament were steadfast in their sleepy ways, rejecting the light their God tried to share with them. Likewise, John tells us that, though Light — Christ — was sent into the world, the world preferred darkness.

Sometimes it seems, when reading through Scripture, that all throughout salvation history, God has been trying to pull back the curtains, to rouse us from our defiant slumber. And we resist Him. Time and time again, we resist Him.

Light brings a certain responsibility with it. It seems to compel productivity. Furthermore, there's no hiding in the light. Any photographer worth his salt knows how to manipulate it, highlighting the good and casting some merciful shade on the bad.

As we enter into the fourth week of Lent, we're getting so close to the main event. Can we handle the light that will come on Easter morning, bursting into the tomb as the stone is rolled away? Can we keep ourselves from hitting the "snooze" button on our souls, and sit up to face the dawn of a new day? — Tracy Earl Welliver, MTS ©LPi
